PROGRAM FORMAT

FREQUENCY

6-8 sessions per year Day: Friday Duration: 1.5 hours Mentor Provision: One mentor from each side will facilitate the session, eliminating language barriers.

MENTOR TRAINING

No training is required for the mentor. The platform is designed to be open and interactive, with the mentor serving as a facilitator for questions and answers during the conversation.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS

12-15 students per session is an effective number as it allows for equal participation from each student during interactive activities
